

Persuasive Writing or Discussion

Compare Michael Scully's comments and explanations of his father's and grandfather's farm practices with the newspaper articles, editorials, and books on the subject. How are the related versions similar? How are they different? Whose point of view is espoused in each source? How did the Irish

system of land management fare in the United States from 1850 to 1950? What systems took its place on the large holdings of Scully and others? Why?

Make conclusions about what you learned on the issue of land management systems. Give economic and historical reasons for

your point of view. Use examples from your research to bolster your reasoning. Include timeframes in your conclusions – whether under some conditions, one type of land management emerges as more economically sustainable than another, and who, if anyone gains.

For Parents or Teachers

This activity involves persuasive essay writing or discussion after doing research on an historical topic.

Primary sources such as audio and video oral histories, newspaper articles, and documents such as lease agreements are used to give evidence of facts and attitudes of the time. Many people take it for granted in the United States that farmers own their own land. Tales of the pioneers and western settlement reinforce this attitude. Many of the immigrants to the United States came here precisely because they could not own land in their home country, such as Ireland, Scotland, or England.

There are reasons why farmers either want to own their land, or why they may want to rent land. Discover the ups and downs of both types of land management in agriculture. "It cost almost as much to lease land in England as it did in Illinois to buy it"
