The crops that are grown are corn and soy beans. The Gommels have three children that have all graduated from college and have moved on to non-manual labor jobs.

INTERVIEWERS COMMENTS

After I finished taping, Mr. Gommel told me about his father who moved to Malta from Germany in 1908. He then talked about his father's farm and how it had so many farm animals living on it. The interview is very usefull in understanding the life-style of a farm family, economic changes, technological changes, and the role of the farm bureau.
