Mr and Mrs. Gommel were married in 1940 and have lived in their home in Malta ever since then. their farm started out with 150 acres and has increased to 320 acres. The crops that are grown are corn and soy beans. The Commels have three children that have all graduated from college and have moved on to non-manual labor jobs.

INTERVIEWERS COMMENTS

After I finished taping, Mr. Gommel told me about his father who moved to Malta from Germany in 1908. He then talked about his father's farm and how it had so many farm animals living on it. The interview is very usefull in understanding the life-style of a farm family, economic changes, technological changes, and the role of the farm bareau.

I would like to add that Mr. Gommel is hard of hearing and that Mrs. Gommel is almost completely deaf; consequenting there are many questions respected durring the interview, or sometimes even missunderstood.
